

#### Ann and Randy Glick 3 workshops November 20, 21, and 22

Sign up now for 3 different workshops from Ann and Randy Glick from Great Falls. Randy Glick is a Montana Circle of American Masters inductee and has taught extensively and won numerous awards for his spinning. He enjoys spinning, weaving and knitting. Most recently, he spun over 30,000 yards of "historically accurate" singles for a Celtic weaving done by a German weaver. Ann is a seasoned spinner who excels at the technical aspects of spinning. She has won numerous awards at the Montana State fair for both her handspun yarns and finished projects – including "Best of Fair" spinning and best handspun/hand knit.

**Friday 10-4 Beginning Spinning by Ann Glick \$45:** Whether you have never spun before, haven't spun for a while, or need a little "tune up" this course if perfect for you. Learn in a small class setting that promises lots of individualized attention. All spinning fibers will be provided. Bring a wheel in good working order. Wheels will be available to use during the class if you don't have a wheel. Limit 6 students. Please indicate at the bottom of your registration if you need to borrow a wheel.

Sat 10-4:30 Splendid Singles and Perfect Plying Randy Glick \$45 Splendid Singles--Learn to bring together the wheel, the material, and you to create the single you would like to spin. Move out of your "I always spin these singles" so you can create the basis for the yarns of your wildest dreams. Perfect Plying--Learn to add energy and excitement to your yarns through plying. After brushing up on the basics mechanics of plying we will explore various techniques to create new and interesting results. Bring a wheel in good working order, lazy kate, and empty bobbins. For intermediate spinners. Limit 15 spinners

Sun 4-19 10-3:30 Spinning Beaded Yarn, Recycled Silk Yarn, core spinning and tail spinning and more Randy Glick \$45. With beaded yarn--Add a little bling to your yarn using a technique that Randy developed that "locks" the beads in place and provides a balanced yarn perfect for that special project. Next move onto using that recycled silk fiber "sari silk" in a special yarn. Then Randy will show how to create other special, but usable yarns. Fiber, beads and other supplies will be provided. Bring a wheel in good working order, lazy kate, and 3 empty bobbins. For intermediate spinners.

# Call for Vendors June 23 -26, 2016

Montana Association of Weavers & Spinners (MAWS) FIBERS ON THE FLATHEAD is looking for vendors for next June's state-wide conference. This true Montanastyle event will be held at the United Methodist Camp on the west side of beautiful Flathead Lake near Rollins,

MT. For more

information about this venue, go to www. flatheadcamp.org.

Vendors will be on stage inside an airy chapel with windows and overhead lighting. Electricity and cell phone reception are available for all booths, but no Wi-Fi except in the dining hall of the camp. The option of bringing a wind-resistant vendor's tent to set up outdoors is also offered. All vendors will need to bring their own tables.

The indoor floor space is limited to 10 to 12 vendors, so Fibers on the Flathead will accept applications and review them to select a variety of products that relate to fiber arts. From the viewpoint of the vendor, the fewer number of booths will offset limited traffic from the public beyond the estimated 100 attendees. There will be an Open Market from 9 to 4 on Saturday, when people from off site will be invited to come to shop and see the Lakeside Story gallery.

Vendors are invited to stay at the camp and eat meals with the attendees. See the Vendor Application for costs. Lunches may be delivered to the vendor area upon request.





The main Conference kicks off with a Thursday evening BBQ on June 23, 2016 with the vendors' Grand Opening starting after dinner at 7 pm. Vendors will be open much of Friday and Saturday, according to the schedule below, but will be closed during dinners for two hours. Friday dinner will feature a keynote speech by Robyn Spady, and Saturday's banquet will include presentation of awards and a style show.

Friday, with the attendees in classes from 9:00 – 12:00 and from 1:30 – 4:00, vendors may choose to close their booths and sign up for classes, opening in the morning, lunchtime and after dinner. Security will be provided by the vendors' committee.

**Vendor applications must be received by Jan 6, 2016** so that vendors can be notified of their acceptance in time to enroll in classes once registration opens up on Jan 15. Contracts will be sent out by Jan 11, and selected vendors will be able to register for classes at that point, with contracts and payment due by March 1.

Accommodations include cabins with single-sex dormitory-style sleeping or space for tents near the lake. Bring your own bedding or sleeping bag, pillow, shower sandals, flashlight and bath towel. Vendors and instructors are also being given top priority for the six RV sites with water and electricity hook-ups (no dump station.) Self-contained trailers and campers may park elsewhere on the grounds.

Families and vendors with pets may consider the nearby state or private campgrounds. Hotels are available in nearby Lakeside, or Kalispell, MT. See www.mawsonline.org/conferences and events for listings of off-site accommodations.

Please note that a limited number of cabins have bathrooms with showers. Bathhouses with private shower stalls are near the other cabins. Please contact Joan Goldstein (contact info. above) about any physical or health issues to ensure accommodations fit your needs. We have one cabin with handicapped-accessibility and shower, but no private rooms. Golf carts, driven by volunteers, will help move campers throughout the grounds.

#### The Living Treasure Award

#### A Tribute to Outstanding Fiber Artists Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners

The Montana Association of Weaver and Spinners' (MAWS) Living Treasure Award is designed to recognize and honor MAWS members who have made outstanding contributions in the field of fiber arts. The award is bestowed biennially on a fiber artist who has demonstrated excellence in craftsmanship, provided leadership or has been a source of inspiration and encouragement to others, or who has contributed to the betterment and development of the fiber arts at the local, state, regional or national level. It is these Montana "treasures" to whom we wish to pay tribute.

The Living Treasure Award recipient is selected solely by the Living Treasure Committee which consists of MAWS board members.

All nominations for the Living Treasure Awards to be awarded June 25, 2016 at the Biennial Conference on Flathead Lake, south of Kalispell, must be received by Mary Melander, address below, by March 15, 2016.

#### **Rules for Nomination**

- 1. Any current MAWS member is eligible for nomination.
- 2. Nominees must be nominated by current MAWS members.
- 3. The MAWS Living Treasure committee must receive at least two separate nomination submissions for a nominee to be considered.
- 4. Each nomination must include a detailed resume of the nominee's accomplishments and contributions to the field of fiber arts. Guidelines for submission follow.
- 5. Nominations must be received by March 15, 2016.
- 6. Announcement of the award winner will be presented at the MAWS biennial conference.
- 7. Each honoree's name will be added to the MAWS Living Treasure Award plaque. Honorees will also be recognized on the MAWS website Living Treasure page. ## Robyn Spady **Block Party**



Do the terms "block design" and "profile draft" bewilder you? Are you interested in developing new patterns and pushing your loom to new limits? Whether you have a four-shaft loom and want to expand its potential or want to better understand what to with all those shafts, then this workshop is for you! Through presentation, discussion, and weaving, you will develop a practical understanding of blocks, profile drafts, and how to use them to create new exciting drafts. 


Alpine Weavers and Spinners Guild member Glenda Smith won Best of Show in hand knitting at the NW MT Fair with this wonderful hat.

# How guilds can apply for a MAWS grant

MAWS Workshop grants of up to \$400 each are available to member guilds. These are used to help defray the expense of bringing an instructor to the host city. Participation in the workshop must be made available to MAWS members state-wide and must be advertised through the MAWS newsletter or by correspondence with the other MAWS guilds. Registration should be open on a date specified in the announcement of the workshop. Local guild members will also be held to that date (no early

registrations). Requests should contain the following information:

- Instructor name
- Classes to be offered
- Dates, time and place of workshop
- Total cost to guild
- Maximum number of participants
- Plan for communicating to MAWS
  - Beginning registration date

After the workshop is over, the host guild will send the board a written report to include the following:

- Number of participants
- A description of the workshop content
  - How you liked it/or didn't
  - Some photos if possible
- Anything else you think might be useful!

The intent is to give future workshop planners some concrete information about the instructor, their classes and teaching success.
